INTRODUCTION

Lights Out DC, an advocacy program modeled after *Lights Out Toronto* (Canada) and others in the US, was launched by City Wildlife, Washington, DC, in April 2010. “*Lights Out*” programs have been established in a growing number of major North American cities, beginning in the early 1990’s. They aim to quantify light-caused bird/building collisions and to encourage building managers to take steps that mitigate the damage to birds.

Twice yearly, during spring and fall bird migrations, millions of birds fly ancient routes to distant feeding and nesting grounds, often traveling thousands of miles. Most small birds migrate at night to avoid rough air patterns and to navigate by the stars. In cities, where lights are often on all night in tall buildings and pointed skyward, migrating birds become disoriented and fly into glass. Many are killed instantly. Others are injured or are so weak from trying to fly through the glass that they become exhausted and become victims of urban predators such as rats, crows, and gulls.

Results from counts like *Lights Out DC* provide invaluable information to concerned citizens and scientists about the problem of nocturnal bird/building collisions. The information in this report reflects the species and numbers of migratory birds killed and injured while passing through downtown DC to points north (in the spring) and south (in the fall). Comparisons of data in the coming years can be used to monitor changes in the distribution of these species and to measure the effects of (human) behavior change when buildings in the District adopt recommendations set forth by *Lights Out DC*.

Lights Out programs have been shown to reduce migrating bird mortality by as much as 80 percent in some cities. What’s more, they reduce light pollution and save participants money spent on energy costs. We see this as a win-win situation for people and migrating birds.

BIRDS FOUND

The following list includes all 47 species of birds found by *Lights Out DC* volunteers in 2011. A total of 212 individual birds were picked up. For more detailed information, please see the attached data table “Lights Out DC Bird Inventory, 2011.”

METHOD

Almost every morning throughout the months of April, May, September, and October 2011, a group of *Lights Out DC* volunteers met at Union Station at 5:30 a.m. Generally they walked an approximately two-hour-long route to the Convention Center and back.

Routes were often extended by car for efficiency, and some of the volunteers covered extra buildings before the 5:30 a.m. meet-up time. Routes were intentionally arranged so as to include buildings with architectural features thought to be particularly problematic: tall glass atria, large expanses of reflective glass, overhead glass walkways, etc.

One monitored the court building where she works at 430 E Street, NW. Other individual birds were reported and delivered to the *Lights Out DC* group by people who were not regular volunteers. These birds are included in the inventory.

Dead birds were collected in plastic bags that were sealed shut. The date, location found, and species were written on the bag. The specimens were frozen. Injured birds were transported to Second Chance Wildlife Center in Gaithersburg, MD, for rehabilitation with the goal of release to the wild. 33 birds recovered sufficiently that they could be released later that day by *Lights Out DC* volunteers.

A running inventory of birds was created, listing the species, location found, condition (dead, stunned, injured, or exhausted), disposition (freezer, released, died, or sent to rehab), volunteer's initials, and volunteer hours expended. At the end of the year, most bird carcasses were delivered to the Smithsonian Migratory Bird Center for research or display.

The Maryland Ornithological Society was of great assistance in helping to identify the similar-looking bird species.

Recommendations for collecting dead birds and handling adult injured birds were obtained from Toronto's FLAP (Fatal Light Awareness Program), *Lights Out Baltimore!*, and the New York City Audubon Society. Our work was permitted by the US Fish and Wildlife Service under a special purpose-salvage permit, number MB00680A-0.

CONCLUSIONS

1. The second year of *Lights Out DC* data continues to demonstrate that fatal and injurious bird/building collisions occur during the night in downtown Washington, DC, during times of bird migrations. Although height restriction of buildings in the District of Columbia may mitigate the number of nocturnal bird/building collisions in comparison with other cities, numerous collisions do occur.
2. A success from the 2010 collection effort was that the Architect of the Capitol agreed to turn out the atrium lights on the trees in the Thurgood Marshall Judiciary building. Once the atrium lights were turned out, bird deaths at this location declined by 2/3.
3. In 2011, we adjusted the route, eliminating some buildings and adding others that were found to have bird strikes. With an increase in the number of days covered (from an average of 2-3/week in 2010 to 6-7/week in 2011) and in the effectiveness of our methods (we were able to extend our surveillance through the cooperation of a number of maintenance people who believed in our mission), we found a greater number of birds and a greater variety of species in 2011 over 2010.
4. Over 40 species of birds were collected. The majority of these species are migratory birds, and the majority of them are neo-tropical migrants. Populations of many of these birds continue to decline each year for a number of reasons, including bird/building collisions in cities along their migratory routes. As scientists become increasingly aware of the risks collisions with man-made structures pose to birds, there have been calls to focus on the impact to avian populations on a species by species basis. Conservation efforts in general are trending this way. Eight types of birds that our organization found in 2011 are listed in the District of Columbia's [Wildlife Action Plan's Species of Greatest Conservation Need](#). For example, last year we found twenty ovenbirds, a species that is "imperiled" in DC, as designated by this plan. The field sparrow also has an "imperiled" status in DC. Other types of birds that we have collected are "vulnerable," including the brown thrasher and the wood thrush, the official bird of DC.

5. Only a small portion of the District of Columbia's downtown area was covered by *Lights Out DC* volunteers. Moreover, volunteers did not monitor every day of the migration period. The resulting data is, then, but a sampling. Nonetheless, it indicates that bird/building collisions are a significant problem in the city and pose a considerable threat to the continued survival of some species of birds whose numbers are in serious decline.
