INTRODUCTION

Lights Out DC, an education and advocacy program modeled after similar ones in Toronto, Chicago, New York, Baltimore, San Francisco, and many other cities in the US, was launched by City Wildlife in April 2010. It aims to quantify light-caused bird/building collisions, identify especially problematic structures, and encourage building managers to take steps that mitigate the mortality of birds.

Twice yearly, during spring and fall bird migrations, millions of birds fly ancient routes to distant feeding and nesting grounds, often traveling thousands of miles. Most small birds migrate at night when the air is calm. They may even be using the stars to navigate. In cities, where lights are often on all night in tall buildings and pointed skyward, migrating birds become disoriented and fly into glass. Many are killed instantly. Others are injured or become so exhausted from trying to fly through a window that they fall. On the ground, many become victims of urban predators — rats, crows, and gulls — or street sweepers.

Results from counts like Lights Out DC provide invaluable information to concerned citizens and scientists about the problem of nocturnal bird/building collisions. The information in this report reflects the species and numbers of migratory birds killed and injured while passing through downtown DC to points north (in the spring) and south (in the fall). Comparisons of data from year to year are used to monitor changes in the distribution of these species and to measure the effects of buildings' voluntary compliance with recommendations set forth by Lights Out DC.

Lights Out programs have been shown to reduce migrating bird mortality by as much as 80 percent in some cities. What's more, they reduce light pollution, reduce factors contributing to global warming, and save participants money spent on energy costs. In the end, it's a win-win situation for people and migrating birds.

Lights Out DC Activities under the Urban Migratory Bird Treaty Grant

Awareness and concern about the problem of bird/glass collisions continue to grow. In fall 2012 the District Department of the Environment awarded City Wildlife an Urban Migratory Bird Treaty grant of \$10,000 in support of Lights Out DC; the grant monies were utilized in 2013. The grant covered costs of publicity and outreach efforts aimed at building owners and the general public to encourage them to turn off unnecessary lights during migration seasons. In accordance with the grant agreement, City Wildlife matched the awarded funds with volunteer hours and pro bono help.

Under the grant, Lights Out DC produced and distributed educational brochures explaining the hazards that light poses for migrating birds.

Also as part of the grant, Lights Out DC sent letters to the city's predominant building management companies and seven Business Improvement Districts (BIDs). These letters explained the issue and requested voluntary agreement to limit nighttime lighting at their buildings. Lights Out DC met in person or had phone conversations with 17 companies or BIDs. To date, three companies, Paramount for 425 I Street NW, Tower Companies, and Washington Harbour, have signed the voluntary pledge to reduce their nighttime lighting.

In 2013, City Wildlife's Anne Lewis presented the first ever Bird Friendly Construction seminar to architects at the American Institute of Architect's national convention held June 19-22 in Denver, CO. The seminar was attended by approximately 85 architects and included presentations by an architect who designs bird-friendly buildings in New York and by a member of the San Francisco Planning Department, where a new law requires bird-friendly construction for many of San Francisco's new buildings.

Lights Out DC also produced and distributed an educational brochure about the dangers posed by domestic cats to migratory birds.

Media Coverage

In March 2013, Anne Lewis and Lisbeth Fuisz gave a 20 minute presentation on Lights Out DC at the DC Environmental Film Festival, following the movie *Central Park Effect*. Lights Out DC Contributions to Citizen Science

In 2013, Scott R. Loss, Tom Will, Sara S. Loss, and Peter P. Marra, experts in conservation biology and particularly bird-window collisions, published a research article that drew on Lights Out DC's and similar programs' cumulative data. They estimate that 300 million to 1 billion birds are killed annually in the United States. Lights Out DC will continue to share its data with scientists intent on documenting and mitigating bird casualties from glass collisions. In response to this report, Lights Out DC is in the process of implementing additional best practices for citizen science data collection.

Birds Found

Table 1 includes all 46 species of birds found by Lights Out DC volunteers in 2013. (This does not include birds that were unable to be identified.) A total of 206 individual birds were picked up. For more detailed information, please see the attached data table "Lights Out DC Bird Inventory, 2013."

Locations Where Birds Were Found

Dead, injured or exhausted birds were found at 57 locations (not including unknown locations; see Table 2). They are listed in Table 2 along with the number of birds found at each. For more detailed information, please see the attached data table.

METHOD

Unless extreme weather precluded it, a group of Lights Out DC volunteers met at 5:30 a.m. every morning throughout the months of April, May, September, October and into November 2013 to walk — or in some cases, drive — prescribed routes and search for dead and injured migratory birds. Routes were intentionally arranged so as to include buildings with architectural features thought to be particularly problematic: tall glass atria, large expanses of reflective glass, overhead glass walkways, etc. The purposes of monitoring are to determine the extent of the problem in DC, to identify problem buildings, and to generate data that will change behavior.

As in previous years, the primary route began at Union Station and extended to 10th Street, NW; it was covered six to seven days per week. Volunteers on this route generally also checked the Hart Senate Office Building for birds. Volunteers also monitored a second route focused on the Foggy Bottom area of Northwest DC. This route, which began and ended at the Foggy Bottom Metro Station, was covered three times per week.

Some volunteers covered extra buildings before the 5:30 a.m. meet-up time. Others monitored buildings where they work, and individual birds were reported and delivered to the Lights Out DC group and to City Wildlife's Wildlife Rehabilitation Center by people who were not regular volunteers. All of these birds are included in the inventory.

Dead birds were collected in plastic bags. The date, location found, and species were written on the bag. The specimens were frozen and later given to the Smithsonian Institute's Museum of Natural History. Thirty-

four of the 205 birds collected were injured or stunned, but recovered sufficiently that they could be released later that day by Lights Out DC volunteers.

Recommendations for collecting dead birds and handling adult injured birds were obtained from Toronto's FLAP (Fatal Light Awareness Program), Lights Out Baltimore!, and the New York City Audubon Society. Our work was permitted by the US Fish and Wildlife Service under a special purpose-salvage permit, number MB00680A-0.

CONCLUSIONS

1. The fourth year of Lights Out DC data continues to demonstrate that a significant number of fatal and injurious bird/building collisions occur during the night in downtown Washington, DC, during times of bird migrations.
2. Citizen science programs like Lights Out DC are an indispensable part of new and ongoing research on bird-window collisions. Lights Out DC's data was and will continue to be utilized by scientists researching the problem, contributing to a deepening understanding of the issue.
3. Initial interest in Lights Out DC from building management and BIDs was strong, but follow-through was limited. Lights Out DC will continue directing outreach efforts at building management and BIDs, suggesting other methods to reduce bird kills, since lighting may not be the only problem in every building: other problems include transparent glass or highly reflective, mirrored glass. For example, although the Architect of the Capitol continues to dim the lights in the atrium of the Thurgood Marshall Federal Judiciary Center during migrations periods, Lights Out DC volunteers found a total of 39 birds at that location. Some are striking the glass atrium after the lights are turned on at 6:00 a.m. or even after sunrise.
4. Approximately 47 species of birds were collected. The majority of these species are migratory birds, and the majority of them are neo-tropical migrants. Populations of many of these birds continue to decline each year for a number of reasons, including bird/glass collisions in cities along their migratory routes. Eleven species of birds that our organization found in 2013 — American Woodcock, Brown Creeper, Eastern Towhee, Field Sparrow, Grasshopper Sparrow, Louisiana Waterthrush, Ovenbird, Scarlet Tanager, Sora, Wood Thrush, and Worm-Eating Warbler — are listed in the District of Columbia's Wildlife Action Plan as "species of greatest conservation need."
5. Only a small portion of the District of Columbia's downtown area was covered by Lights Out DC volunteers. Volunteers documented that birds are being killed by collisions with glass in the Foggy Bottom area as well as near the National Mall. However, volunteers did not monitor every day of the migration period. Additionally, volunteers frequently find birds on their second pass of a building on the same morning, at times witnessing the collisions as they occur, indicating that there is an element of chance in recovering the birds. The resulting data is, then, but a sampling. Nonetheless, it indicates that bird-building collisions are a significant problem in the city and pose a considerable threat to the continued survival of some species of birds whose numbers are in serious decline. Buildings around the Mall and Capitol appear to be particularly problematic due to the combination of water, planes of glass, and dense tree cover that attract birds seeking refuge after a night of flight.
